The Tax Fairness for Workers Act

Previously, the Tax Code allowed workers to take numerous deductions when filing their taxes such as union dues, uniforms, tools, and travel. The 2017 Republican Tax Bill suspended deductions for union dues and other common employee expenses. This bill, sponsored by US Senator Casey, will reinstate the deduction for unreimbursed expenses such as union dues, uniforms, tools for the job and travel. - Preventing employers from waiving workers' rights to class-action litigation
